
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


What exactly is cultural appropriation?

Cultural appropriation refers to picking and choosing elements of a culture by a member of another culture without permission. This includes traditional knowledge, religious symbols, artifacts or any other unauthorized use of cultural practice or ideation.

All told, the massive surge in web traffic and social media action spurred by Cyrus' performance was likely the result of a combination of factors. First, Cyrus' performance was unique, controversial and meant to draw a crazed reaction. It succeeded there. But, the surge also shows how critical a role Twitter plays alongside live events today. At the peak of last year's VMAs, for example, Twitter only registered 98,000 tweets per minute. This year, that number more than tripled.

BRIDGING DIFFERENCES THROUGH DIALOGUE

BUILDING BRIDGES BETWEEN PEOPLE FROM DIFFERENT social backgrounds becomes increasingly important as our society becomes more diverse and socially stratified. One way we can foster learning and understanding across differences is to bring college students together to talk and learn from each other, to find ways to communicate, and to understand why it is not always easy to get along or to identify common ground. However, bringing college students from different backgrounds together to talk, as anyone who has tried to do it knows, is a complex and challenging undertaking. This essay describes one promising approach for meeting this challenge, intergroup dialogue.

Is it ever OK to borrow from other cultures?

The biggest issue with cultural appropriation is that it belittles the origin culture, in a way that trivializes an entire way of life, turning it into an accessory. If you are a sensitive and respectful individual, the only time it is OK, is with permission or authorization by the origin culture.

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
