



Instructions

First, complete the table at the top of the page by writing down how you identify under each socially constructed identity. For example, under race one could write, "Asian American," or "Multi-Racial." After completing the identity grid, assign each slice of your identity a piece of the pie chart in the center of the page. The larger the slice, the more *salient*, or meaningful, that identity is for you right now. Assign smaller pie slices to the identities that you are less aware of right now. Try to fill 100% of the pie chart with your identity slices.



Latino- Integrated	Wide	Individuals in a group context	Positively	Complex	Dynamic, contextual, socially constructed
Latino- Identified (Racial/Raza)	Broad	Latinos	Very Positively	Distinct; could be barriers or allies	Latino/not Latino
Subgroup- Identified	Narrow	Own subgroup	My group OK, others maybe	Not central (could be barriers or blockers)	Not clear or central; secondary to nationality, ethnicity, culture


- U.S. Hispanics have many different cultures

Racial Identification among Latinos




Do You Think of Yourself as a Typical American?
