HIV stands for human immunodeficiency virus. It is the virus that causes AIDS, the acquired immunodeficiency syndrome.

A few HIV/AIDS facts:

- Over 90% of people with HIV are infected through sexual contact.
- You can now get tested for HIV using a saliva sample.
- HIV is not passed on through spitting, biting or sharing utensils.
- Only 1% of babies born to HIV positive mothers have HIV.
- You can get the results of an HIV test in just 15-20 minutes.
- There is no vaccine and no cure for HIV.

The Paul Hart Fund Scholarships are available to members of ACPA to support attendance at the 2013 meeting of ACPA. The Paul Hart Scholarship Fund, administered by the American College Personnel Association, was established in 1995 to provide scholarships for ACPA members who are either living with HIV/AIDS, or have a family member, dependent, partner, spouse, or child living with HIV/AIDS so that they may attend the Annual Convention. Scholarship funds are made available from Paul Hart's estate, and donations are received year-round. Scholarships are made to those individuals who would not be able to attend the Annual Convention without such financial assistance. Deadline to apply is February 15th, 2013.

Moving On After Our Agenda: Educate, Advocate, Eliminate AIDS

A convention staple that has been present since the 1989 ACPA convention in Washington, DC, will not be present this year in Vegas. The AIDS Memorial, originally sponsored by the Standing Committee for LGB Awareness, was created in response to the AIDS Crisis of the 1980s. Professionals in higher education wanted an opportunity to come together to acknowledge the struggle of those living with HIV/AIDS, and those that loved and supported them. In addition, there was a need for a space to remember those who had been lost, and call attention to the growing epidemic.

Over the years 24 years, the AIDS Memorial featured panels from the Project AIDS

Memorial Quilt, performances by the AIDS Memorial choir, and many personal stories and moments of remembrance. In 2010, the AIDS Memorial became Our Agenda: Educate, Advocate, Eliminate AIDS. Our Agenda continued the work of AIDS Memorial, fostering spaces to continue to remember, learn, and connect.

Attendance at Our Agenda has fallen sharply, and it has become increasingly difficult to organize the event without increased assistance from other commissions and standing committees, as well as the greater association. And just as the AIDS Crisis has changed over the years, so have the needs of our members and programs. With this in mind, we believe the time is right to move forward. This decision was not reached lightly, as there is a great deal of history and emotion connected to the program. However, many factors have come together to demonstrate that the time has come.

This being said, our work is not done. While the conditions for those living with HIV/AIDS in America have vastly improved, there are still many challenges to be faced in the long fight against the disease, and many, many members of our community are still touched by HIV/AIDS. We acknowledge these realities and will continue to engage in this vital conversation. The SCLGBTA remains dedicated to collaborating with other areas to promote awareness and action and looks forward to these efforts. Our committee will also continue to provide opportunities to engage, from red ribbons to collecting for the Paul Hart Fund, helping ACPA members affected by HIV/AIDS afford convention each year. While Our Agenda may be departing, we know that Our Agenda will remain focused on creating positive, inclusive change, no matter what programs come and go.

The First Year

This year, the SCLGBTA will be featuring a column in each newsletter, chronicling one higher ed professional's journey from graduate school to a full time LGBT-focused professional position. Petey Peterson just started a position as the Program Coordinator for Vanderbilt University's Office of Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer and Intersex Life (LACTIC). In this article, Petey explores how to best approach the job search as an LBGTQI identified professional.

Preparing for the job search can seem like a daunting task. From revising and updating your resume, to writing cover letter after cover letter, the process is challenging and stressful. There is also the added pressure of finding that dream job in just the right city, at just the right institution, with just the right pay. Who needs any more added stressors? For professionals who identify as LGBTQQIA and beyond, there can be several added pressures. Questions arise such as: Do I out myself in my cover letter or resume? Is my resume too "gay" or too "queer," or is it not "gay" or "queer" enough? What if this intuition does not have the policies that protect my gender or sexual identity? What if I am

the first Trans* person to work in this department, this office, or even worse, this institution? What if there are no domestic partner benefits offered? The list can go on and on. Before I began the job search, I asked myself: Was this going to be about me, or the work? I quickly realized and I should have known better that it is impossible to separate those two things, especially in higher education and student affairs.

After I came to terms with that realization, I decided that I need to figure out if I was willing to go where the work and showing up authentically as myself would be easy, or if I could handle going where the work and showing up as myself would be an everyday challenge. To be honest, I settled for the middle. Now, don't get me wrong: I applied for jobs that I knew the institution, the city, and the office I was applying to work in would be affirming and accepting of my identities, such as LGBT centers on the coasts. I also knew that for some jobs, flaunting my rainbow flag on my resume and cover letter gave was an advantage for the position. Yet, I also applied to jobs that I knew would be challenging, but I also knew I wanted to work where showing up everyday as myself would be an education for the students and colleagues around me. I can say that at the time, I felt ready for this challenge, and as someone whose marginalized identities can be invisible to most, I felt an obligation to put myself in a space where I would be out and open to questions, looks, and even possible harassment.

Given my experiences, the best advice I can give is to know you. Know your limits and what you are willing to take on. Also, read about the policies and protections that are in place at every institution you apply, such as: In the institution's HR non-discrimination policy, is sexual orientation and gender identity included? If not, is this a place I want to work? The answer may be no, but the answer could also be yes because you could be one of the voices to help change that policy. This can also look different if your job search also affects others. For example, if you have a partner who would be moving with you, or a partner and children, are you applying to an institution that would protect and provide inclusive benefits to not only you, but also your family?

There are institutions I considered applying to and then did not because based on the policies, location of the institution, and the camps climate for LGBTQI individuals, I knew that the challenges would be too weighty for me. For professionals who do not wish to be out in the job search process, I would encourage you still to consider the policies, campus climate, and systems of support that are in place for LGBTQI faculty, staff and students as your identity will come with you regardless, and you never know when you or the ones you care about may require certain support or protections.
