

2010-2011 Highlights

Globalization Plan – The ACPA Governing Board approved a comprehensive globalization report to guide the Association's efforts to not only be more responsive to our international members but to prepare the next generation of global leaders. ACPA is committed to a threefold strategy that furthers global relationships among student affairs/student services professionals, advances a common understanding of our work, and supports the preparation and continuing development of scholars and practitioners who identify with this field. Strategic goals:

- 1. Relationships Facilitate global professional communication and partnerships
- 2. Knowledge Base Encourage knowledge generation and dissemination
- 3. Professional Preparation Support professional preparation and continuing professional development

Re-chartering of AZCPA – In response to the request submitted by Jennifer Ludwig and Mary Irwin, co-chairs of the Arizona State Division Organizing Committee, the ACPA Governing Board approved the re-chartering of the Arizona College Personnel Association on February 12, 2010.

Re-chartering of DCCPA – In response to the request of Charter Committee Chair, Chris Moody, and the work of a group of dedicated professionals within the Washington, D.C. metro area, the ACPA Governing Board approved the re-chartering of the District of Columbia College Personnel Association on July 23, 2010.

Joint Competencies Project – Dwayne Todd and Marilee Bresciani, co-chairs of the ACPA and NASPA Joint Task Force on Professional Competencies and Standards successfully created a draft set of 10 competency areas, very similar to ACPA's list developed several years ago. The document was presented at each associations' annual meetings and accepted and endorsed by ACPA Governing Board on July 24, 2010.

Joint Task Force on Future of the Profession Report – The Governing Board accepted the report on the Joint Task Force on Future of the Profession Report presented by Vasti Torres, cochair. The two major areas of concentration for the Joint Task Force were: 1) Rethinking student affairs work and 2) Unifying student affairs. In rethinking student affairs work the group sought to look at the campus more broadly. It was noted that ACPA is more willing to take risks in rethinking how we provide professional development. In terms of speaking in a unified voice, the group tried to give evidence and set the stage should unification happen.

New Commissions – After several years in the formation stage, the ACPA Governing Board approved the creation of two major topical areas of the profession: the Commission for Spirituality, Faith, Religion, and Meaning and the Commission on Recreation and Athletics approved on March 19, 2010.

MMI Institute in Arizona – Given the perceived discrimination associated with the Arizona Immigration Law SB1070, and in accordance with ACPA's Statement of Ethical Principles, the ACPA Governing Board made the decision on May 14, 2010 to withdraw holding the Donna M. Bourassa Mid-Level Management Institute in Tucson, Arizona as the law demonstrates blatant discrimination against a group of people. The MMI Institute was rescheduled to take place in Tampa, Florida in January 2011.

NAN Partnership – Discussions continue with the ACPA Governing Board and the Native American Network (NAN) representatives with the goal of learning to build better relationships, learn to talk openly and build better bridges. These talks follow the insensitivity expressed from members last year around the use of the "teacup" in promoting the annual convention in Boston, Massachusetts March 2010.

Anti-discrimination Policies – The ACPA Governing Board adopted the following Anti-Discrimination Statement developed in reaction to legislation in several states:

Whereas, the American College Personnel Association (ACPA-College Student Educators International) represents members from private and public colleges and universities from the United States and around the world.

Whereas, the core values of ACPA-College Student Educators International include:

- Education and development of the total student.
- Diversity, multicultural competence and human dignity.
- Inclusiveness in and access to association-wide involvement and decision-making.
- Free and open exchange of ideas in a context of mutual respect.
- Advancement and dissemination of knowledge relevant to college students and their learning, and to the effectiveness of student affairs professionals and their institutions.
- Continuous professional development and personal growth of student affairs professionals.
- Outreach and advocacy on issues of concern to students, student affairs professionals and the higher education community, including equity and inclusion and other policy issues.

Whereas, ACPA-College Student Educators International strenuously objects to any interpretation of policy or law which would then permit discrimination against state employees or students in violation of the Equal Protection Clause of the United States Constitution. Furthermore, ACPA supports the actions of colleges and universities which have publicly opposed efforts to exclude people from protection from bias.

Whereas, as called for in its Statement of Ethical Principles & Standards, "College Student Educators have a responsibility to contribute to the improvement of the communities in which they live and work and to act as advocates for social justice for members of those communities. They recognize that our communities are enhanced by social and individual diversity manifested by characteristics such as age, culture, class, ethnicity, gender, ability, gender identity, race, religion, and sexual orientation." ACPA-College Student Educators International must act on the basis of its principles; it must demonstrate its opposition to discrimination against state employees and students who are members of identified classes.

Let it be resolved that, ACPA-College Student Educators International reaffirms its practice of strongly considering the presence of discriminatory laws and policies when making decisions about entering into commercial relationships and recommends this practice to its members and affiliated entities.

Dream Act – ACPA supported with enthusiasm the proposed Dream Act that was later defeated in Congress. The Hispanic Association of Colleges and Universities (HACU) and the Student Affairs in Higher Education Consortium (SAHEC) offered ACPA an opportunity to be involved in "The Dream Act" an opportunity to establish children of illegal immigrants. (The purpose of the Development, Relief and Education of Alien Minors Act, also called the DREAM Act, is to help those individuals who meet certain requirements, have an opportunity to enlist in the military or go to college and have a path to citizenship which they otherwise would not have without this legislation. Supporters of the DREAM Act believe it is vital not only to the people who would benefit from it, but also the United States as a whole. It would give an opportunity to undocumented immigrant students who have been living in the U.S. since they were young, a chance to contribute back to the country that has given so much to them and a chance to utilize their hard earned education and talents.)

Summer Leadership Meetings for 2010 – Leaders from both ACPA and NASPA met in July 2010 during the Summer Leadership Meeting in Las Vegas, Nevada. From 2010-2011 the ACPA Governing Board was submersed in the details of planning for a consolidated association.

Conducted a Professional Development Audit – At the request of the ACPA Governing Board, the International Office staff conducted an audit of all professional development programs to determine quality of curriculum, financial viability and value to the members. The resulting five programs were accepted and approved by the ACPA Governing Board:

Institute on Social Justice
Residential Curriculum Institute
Student Affairs Assessment Institute
Donna M. Bourassa Mid-Level Management Institute
Institute on Sustainability

Subcommittee to Explore Specialty Colleges – A subcommittee of the Retention Committee was charged to develop a membership and retention plan to attract specialty colleges, HBCUs, HISs, Tribal colleges, art institutes, etc.

New Professionals Institute – The ACPA Governing Board approved the creation and naming of the New Professionals Institute after Phyllis L. Mable, Executive Director of CAS - Council for the Advancement of Standards in Higher Education on March 25, 2011.

HBCU Institute – Coordinated by Terrell Strayhorn, the HBCU Institute was offered for the first time during the March Convention in Baltimore to focus on the needs of our professionals working in Historically Black Colleges and Universities. As there are over 10 HBCUs in the Baltimore metropolitan area, working with these schools is in line with the mission of the Task Force on the Future of the Profession's recommendation. Dr. Paula Ribeau, wife of Howard University President Dr. Sidney A. Ribeau is active in working with local HBCUs and supported the project.

Community College Institute – The Commission for Two-Year Colleges coordinated a very successful Community College Institute. This was the first time ACPA has coordinated a major event targeted to community colleges.

Revamped C3 – Based on the research and communication of current employers and participants, significant changes were made to enhance C3 (Career Central at Convention). The team was able to pinpoint several enhancements.

Career Placement Contract & Services – Effective August 5, 2011 the contract with career services provider Job Target ceased with no penalty to the association. Kristan Cilente, Assistant Director, Career Services and Strategic Partnerships and Bryan Helminiak, 2012 Annual Convention C3 Chair presented a review of the issues associated with career services offered in the past, and presented a developmental model from the candidate's perspective, with options for rethinking how the association can provide career services in the future. Carl Davis, CEO of Think Social Change and Stanton Cheah, Senior Director, Membership, Marketing and Media facilitated rebranding the C3 name with the focus on articulating the issues and presenting the solutions offered by the new software powering C3.

ACPA/NASPA Joint Consolidation – At the spring 2010 ACPA Governing Board meeting during the Executive Session, a resolution was confirmed to state:

'The ACPA Governing Board affirms the ongoing study and discussion of consolidation of ACPA and NASPA. The Governing Board supports the process outlined by the Consolidation Steering Team (CST), yet recognizes the CST may choose to adjust the original timeline. The Governing Board supports a full membership vote no later than December 31, 2010.'

Post Consolidation – The ACPA Governing Board authorized a public relations firm to develop a public relations campaign. Among the many ideas were the MeetUps sessions - grassroots networking events with association members, the "Get to Know Us" campaign which offered NASPA members a complimentary one year membership with ACPA, and full page advertisements in the Chronicle of Higher Education newspaper and Diverse Issues in Higher Education magazine.

New Travel Policy – To become more fiscally responsible, the ACPA Governing Board approved the new travel policy for staff and volunteer leadership during the July 2011 Summer Leadership Meeting.
